Judges' Comments.

EARDISLAND W.I.

Masses of contributors, male and female, under the controlling hand of Mrs Greenbough.

Very systematic. It was a feudal village till 1949 when Mrs Clowes of Burton Court dies and closed a remarkable epoch in the village history. The property was then broken up and sold in units and transformation at once began, but as yet there is no main water or sewerage.

The picture of manor house life of a century ago is fascinating for the Clowes of Burton Court had great authority and were also great personalities. The villagers partook in the life of the manor, e.g. the marriage of Major Clowes was a great event and the death of the only son and heir in the 1914 war was a village tragedy. The Clowes were benevolent patrons - there were big parties, many guests, many servants, great celebrations e.g. Harvest home, the burning of the bush, dances that went on to 3 a.m. - and, on the other hand, disasters of floor and There are three lictures on one page of the village at three different periods: CA Maccount from Riverside Farm 1875 and also for 1935: children's memories 1909 to 1914; agricultural statistics; population tables; occupation tables; a map of field names; extracts from directories, diaries and old rent books. The report is well documented. Then and Now for the housewife, farm labourer, tenant farmer with comparable budgets and prices is excellently done. are photographs of W.I. members in 1874 and 1888.

The best contribution is a good map of the parish and an account of each house in turn. School notes are very comprehensive with subjects taught year by year, quotations from the School log-book, and recollections of an old scholar.

An interesting note on the costard apple, still to be seen in the village, and its connection with "Coster-monger" illustrates the cultural scope of this village study.
