

JOHN DAVID GREENE B. 8TH FEBRUARY 1949, D. FRIDAY 2ND JUNE 2023



John Greene started Border Oak with his brother-in-law, Mark Hicks in 1980, in a shed at the bottom of the orchard behind Knapp House, Eardisland.

From these humble beginnings
John and Mark pioneered the revival of
green oak framing after it had been
obsolete for more than 200 years, creating
an entire sector of housing that is still
thriving today and setting up a highly
successful local business, now based in
Kingsland. They went on to shape and
influence the UK self and custom build
industry for more than 40 years – renowned
for their sustainable and innovative

approach to house building, both here and abroad. John lived in Eardisland for almost his whole life and loved the village - and he was a generous benefactor to many villages causes over his 74 years.

John was born at his grandparents' home; Crown Cottage, Teapot Turn, Eardisland. He was the first child and only son of Reg and Ethel and deeply loved by all from the moment he arrived. Reg and Ethel were both strong characters and had a huge influence on his life. John has two sisters, Sue and Sally. Crown Cottage was the first of John's homes in Eardisland, but soon after John was born Reg and Ethel bought The Lamb Inn at Stoke Prior and established their successful business, buying, running and selling a number of local pubs along the way.

John attended Dutton House prep school in Leominster from the age of 3. He famously passed his 11+ exam aged 9 and later attended Leominster Grammar School, where he met his wife, Patsy. John's school report is full of 'if only he would try' or 'what a waste of a great mind' phrases. It is clear that many of his teachers were convinced he would achieve very little in life despite being academically gifted. He excelled at Maths, Art, Woodwork and English – which of course would prove very useful later in life.

As a teenager John lived at The White Swan, Eardisland. John was convinced that The White Swan was haunted, recalling several chilling encounters with a distressed figure which made him feel uncomfortable upstairs, and he avoided the first floor even as an adult. But he very much enjoyed listening to the late-night sparring between his father, Francis Greenhough from Staick House and Commander Simpson, who stayed with Ethel and Reg while purchasing Burton Court. John was mystified that the long, confusing and

impassioned debates between these three opinionated, but highly intelligent men, often ended with one of them storming out or getting barred. Yet the next evening they would reconvene and start all over again!

As John came to the end of his school years, Reg and Ethel built a super modern pre-fab bungalow called Bardufoss, on land they owned behind the pub. It was this project that ignited John's early interest in building from scratch. Reg also built a strange subterranean swimming pool that barely held water and had an aviary full of exotic birds, plus a tame pet badger that lived under the bungalow and would sleep under the bar stools at the pub in the evening.

John met Patsy, married at Leominster Priory on the 15th February 1969 and shortly afterwards they moved into The Monument Pub, Kingsland (a wedding gift from Reg and Ethel) becoming the youngest publicans in Herefordshire at the time.

John worked at the bank during the day and would travel to work with Johnny Gittoes from Eardisland. He recalled that Johnny's sage advice had guided him on many an occasion. They also shared a love of jokes and mischief. Those seemingly ordinary, everyday trips were the highlight of John's day and something he valued for all time.

John knew that the banking world wasn't for him, so he followed his love of old buildings and trained as a surveyor – at which he excelled. His natural gift for engineering meant he was successful from a young age, project managing large contracts such as the building of the road over Dinmore Hill. He also lectured at Hereford Tech College which he enjoyed immensely.

After a time at local construction company Bengry's, John accepted a partnership at Lewis' Construction in Ludlow. During his time at Lewis' John visited a farm near Hay on Wye to measure up for a new milking parlour. It was here that he discovered the 14th century oak framed barn that was to transform his life. Terrified that the farmer would carry out his threat to make space for the milking parlour by burning down the old cruck frame, John rashly agreed to buy it, remove it and store it in the garden of Knapp House, the medieval cottage he had bought to restore in Eardisland now that he had a young family.

After restoring Knapp House John began to re-erect the old barn with the hope it could become the next home for his family. Luckily, his sister Sally had married a talented carpenter, Mark, so together they set about building, repairing and restoring this majestic frame learning many traditional methods as they went.

When the time came to ask for planning approval to convert the barn into a home, John encountered resistance from the council. They didn't think it was a building that could be converted into a home and couldn't see that John's passion for green oak framing would come to much. His tricky application was passed to a forward-thinking young planning officer and conservation officer and they offered him a lifeline, intrigued by his crazy idea that green oak was the

future of house building. And so began Border Oak – Mark and John making green oak frames in John's orchard in Eardisland, desperately hoping that someone would buy one.

After much hard work Border Oak became a huge success and John is responsible for an exceptional portfolio of 20th and 21st C homes across the globe – he surpassed all that he could have dreamt of as young schoolboy whose teachers believed would amount to little.

He turned a pile of rescued old beams into a multi-million pound company, provided good jobs for hundreds of people and homes for thousands more – and he saved an entire genre of building from the being consigned to history.

When students study vernacular architectural history in half a century's time, we hope that they know that John David Greene of Eardisland is the reason oak frames are still being made.

There is so much more to say about John, Border Oak, and the importance of what John and Mark achieved over the past 45 years, but sadly not enough space here. John was an industry pioneer and a relentless entrepreneur but he was also a gentleman with an unwavering love of Herefordshire.

In January 2019 John had a cardiac arrest in his office chair and was revived by his work colleagues. After this most would probably take life a little easier. But John felt that he still had a lot to do.

During his recovery time John designed and built a beautiful oak framed home for himself and Patsy on the edge of Eardisland, where everything was designed by John and made by local craftsmen. This won a National Award for the 'Best Self-Build Home 2022'. And he finally purchased Staick House (which had been the home of his father's friend Francis) after years of wanting to restore the majestic manor house that had so inspired him as a child and adult.

John was a wonderfully complex man of many talents, who valued life's simple pleasures. Despite his incredible achievements he was shy, humble and endlessly hardworking. John was kind to his core, generous, loyal and steadfast. He was highly intelligent but also silly, funny, eccentric and an exemplary businessman.

Above all John was an incredible father and grandfather, brother, friend, uncle, colleague and boss.

John died on Friday 2^{nd} June 2023 with Patsy by his side. He was privately cremated on 20^{th} June. His last journey took him from Redgate House, past Knapp House, Earlslaen House, The White Swan, Bardufoss, Church Road, Staick House and then Crown Cottage.

Above all, John David Greene was a great Herefordian.

My thanks to Merry Albright and family for this fascinating account of John's life.

I thank those of you who turned out and supported me to be re- elected as your County Councillor. It is a great pleasure and privilege to represent the Eardisland community and I will continue to do my best to support the wellbeing of parishioners, businesses and our environment.

Annual Fire Service Report

I have been the lead elected councillor for Herefordshire on the Hereford & Worcester Fire Authority for some years and recently the annual report has been published. The service covers the two counties with a joint population of 790,000 people (Herefordshire 190,000), 342,000 households, 48,000 businesses with 4,755 miles of highway.

In the year 2023/24 we saw an increase in incidents of 9% to 8,132 across the two countries, the main increase coming from the number of wild fires during last summer's heatwave. There are 41 fire engines at 25 stations, with 239 wholetime firefighters, 361 on call, 26 control staff and 139 support staff, and a budget of 37 million. The service not only provides response to incidents but deals with prevention and protection matters which include across the counties over 6,500 home visits and also business inspections.

In Herefordshire we have 13 stations with only Hereford being manned with full time crews, which deals with 47% of all the call outs in the county. In the last year there were 1,862 incidents in the county including 454 fires, 643 special incidents including road traffic collisions and 756 false alarms.

We struggle to meet our 10-minute call out response time due to the rural nature of the county and our new targets in rural areas are 20 minutes. This is timed from call centre alert, on call firefighters arriving at station, journeying, and arriving at the incident. Kingsland is our local station and works regularly with our community on preparing for flooding events.

Planning permission has just been gained for a new Hereford Fire Station on the present site and we are negotiating two decamp sites during the rebuild. More details at https://www.hwfire.org.uk/

MORTIMER MEDICAL PRACTICE PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP (PPG)

The Practice has some new staff staring this month a new GP, Dr Dora Hemson, a new practice nurse, Mrs Anita Sharrad and a new receptionist Mrs Christine Downing .

The Government has announced that the healthy 50-64 years old have been removed from this year's Flu Programme. So it will be for over 65s and those clinically vulnerable. As yet there is no information regarding the Autumn COVID booster. The clinics will however be run as before with booked appointments.

The Practice has advertised for some time that hay fever medication can no longer be prescribed routinely. Patients who suffer from hay fever are being encouraged to purchase over the counter medications from pharmacies or local supermarkets.

If when ringing the Practice for an appointment the receptionist asks questions about your symptoms etc. they are not being nosy. They are trying to make sure you are seen at the earliest time by the most appropriate person .

EARDISLAND ENVIRONMENTAL AND SUSTAINABILITY GROUP

The E&SG is a working group of the Parish Council. Anyone interested in making Eardisland a more sustainable parish is welcome to come along.

Parish Council Carbon and Biodiversity Annual Reports

The Parish Council's Climate and Biodiversity Emergency declarations commit the council to producing an annual **Carbon Reduction Impact Report** and **Biodiversity Improvement Report**. These assess the progress the council has made in the previous year across the full range of aims set out in the Environment and Sustainability Policy.

The group has been working on these annual reports for the last few months and presented them to the council on the 8th of June. It is expected these will be published on the council website on the 14th of July. The reports cover a wide range of areas where the Parish Council has influence including management of assets such as the Village Hall and Recreation Ground, spending of public money on suppliers, commenting on planning applications, supporting groups in the parish, and engaging with parishioners.

Following on from the reports the E&SG has produced annual Carbon Reduction and Biodiversity Improvement Plans. These will be presented to the council on the 13th of July and set out a series of prioritised steps the council is recommended to work towards over the next 12 months.

Tree Watering

Our new trees on the recreation ground will need watering over the next 6 months (especially if it's a dry summer). If anyone would like to 'adopt a tree' then there are labels on each tree you can write your name on. Thanks to Jo, Felicity, Susie and Bert who have already signed up! Each tree needs a watering can of water two or three times a week.

There are cans by the Village Hall water butts, and they can be filled from the Village Hall outside tap if needed. Perhaps something that could be done while walking the dog?

Repair Cafés

Repair cafés are run by volunteers and encourage you to bring along broken items to be fixed (if possible) for free, for instance bicycles, electrical appliances, sewing. There are monthly drop-in sessions in Leominster Community Centre 10am - 12:30pm (1st Saturday of the month) and Presteigne Youth Centre 10am - 12pm (3td Saturday of the month).

Soft Plastic Recycling

Soft plastic recycling is now available in Leominster Co-op and Morrisons. Recycling soft plastic can massively reduce the amount of waste in our dustbins. *What is Soft Plastic?*

Soft plastics are lightweight plastics that cannot be placed in the usual recycling bin. Items like plastic film lids on yoghurt pots, soft fruit punnets and ready meals, as well as plastic crisp packets, pasta bags, bread bags, chocolate or biscuit wrappers and bags that fruit and vegetables are packaged in. How to recycle it?

Clean it – give it a quick rinse if it has food on it and then leave it to dry. Scrunch it – give it a squash, if it pings back, it's suitable for soft plastic recycling. Stuff it – save it all up by stuffing it in something like a bread bag. Recycle it – drop it off in Leominster every few weeks (you don't even need to shop in the Co-op or Morrisons).

Secretary of State for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra), the Rt Hon Thérèse Coffey visit to Eardisland on Tuesday 30 May.

Thérèse Coffey came to Herefordshire for the day on May 30th meeting in Hereford in the morning with the farming community, Herefordshire Council, Natural England, Environment Agency, the Welsh Government, local environmental groups, and developers, to discuss the environmental and rural challenges being faced across the River Wye Catchment and the region. The Secretary of State also requested a visit to a Rural Village Hall that had been fortunate to have received Acre funding in the past and still needs future funding. Eardisland Village Hall met that criteria and was privileged to have been chosen for her to visit.

She met with members of the Parish Council and Eardisland Village Hall Management Team to view and admire our Village Hall Facilities, with particular emphasis on the new kitchen facilities, supported and co-funded by the Parish Council, as well as the funding received by Acre. She also discussed future funding needs and requirements that the Government could help with in the future.

The Secretary of State met some of the groups and clubs that meet at the Village Hall including representatives of the Cookery Club, WI, Eardisland Stitchers, the Environment and Sustainability group, the E-Team and enjoyed watching one of Barbara's Pilates Classes. We were fortunate that whilst here she also visited our children's allotment (planting some veg with children from the village) and stopped to chat to bowlers on our village bowling green.

She admired our photo wall in the Main Hall of recent events in the village hall and our recent Coronation Celebration Weekend and expressed what a great village community we have and completed the visit with an announcement of the new Rural Action Plan she is launching in Parliament.

Finally, the Secretary of State announced that the government is looking to publish *Unleashing Rural Opportunity*, which outlines some of the work we've already done and some new initiatives to help rural communities. The core aims are to provide schemes and funding - to help grow the rural economy, to help increase digital connectivity, energy efficiency schemes for rural community buildings and the introduction of affordable housing to help strengthen rural communities.

We look forward to the launch of the new grants where we hopefully will be able to access funding for improvements to the energy efficiency of our Village Hall and funding for a community digital hub inside the meeting room in the hall.

LEMON DRIZZLE CAKE RECIPE – A1

INGREDIENTS

225g unsalted butter, softened
225g caster sugar
4 eggs
225g self-raising flour
1 lemon, zested

DRIZZLE TOPPING

1½ lemons, juiced 85g caster sugar

METHOD

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4.

Beat together the butter and caster sugar until pale and creamy, then add the eggs, one at a time, slowly mixing through.

Sift in the self-raising flour, then add the lemon zest and mix until well combined.

Line a loaf tin (8 x 21cm) with greaseproof paper, then spoon in the mixture and level the top with a spoon.

Bake for 45-50 mins until a thin skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.

While the cake is cooling in its tin, mix together the lemon juice and caster sugar to make the drizzle.

Prick the warm cake all over with a skewer or fork, then pour over the drizzle – the juice will sink in and the sugar will form a lovely, crisp topping. Leave in the tin until completely cool, then remove and serve.

A SUPER CUB REBORN

G-BHOM (S/N: 18-1391) Piper L18C Super Cub. Call sign: "Oscar Mike"

The photos (on page 44) show the aeroplane which is the subject of this article in the 'as bought' red colour scheme and the olive drab scheme which during the restoration I chose to use to represent its use by the French military from February 1952 until August 1968.

When I bought 'Oscar Mike' in July 2014 it was clear that whilst airworthy she was in a somewhat tired condition and would need an overhaul. Having discovered that she had French Military history I was keen to return the aeroplane to its French military paint scheme and thus started many months of research into colours, national markings, insignia etc.

'OM' is an example of the military variant of the Super Cub powered by a 90/95 hp Continental engine and with a large additional area of glazing behind the rear seat.

She was built by the Piper Aircraft Corporation during November 1951 for the United States Air Force (USAF) using frame 18-1272, coming off the production line on the 15th with Constructor's number 18-1391 and given the USAF serial number 51-15391.

During the years 1951 – 1952, 352 of this type were gifted to the French Army by the USAF under the Mutual Defense Assistance Programme. This aeroplane made the transition in January 1952, when it was transferred to the Aviation Légère de L'Armée de Terre (ALAT) – the French Army Air Corps. Serving initially with 1 GAOA (Groupements d'Aviation d'Observation d'Artillerie), a school training observers and pilots in artillery spotting and forward air control. Probably based at Nancy in NE France, 1 GAOA had the unit codes 'Ox then AOx' during the period 14 February 1952 to 30 June 1958. It is these later codes with the addition of an individual aircraft identifier that I have chosen as appropriate for this aeroplane.

After serving with ALAT in various guises the aeroplane was demobbed and sold to Belgium in 1968. It had two identities there OO-HMT and from 1970 OO-PIU. It was sold to the UK in 1980, registered as G-BHOM and spent the next 34 years based at Benington near Stevenage in Hertfordshire.

In the autumn of 2019, I made the decision to take the aeroplane out of the air to carry out a restoration which I thought would take 18 months to 2 years. In fact, it took twice as long and finally flew at the beginning of May this year.

The restoration took the form of a partial re-cover, meaning that the fabric on the fuselage would be replaced but that on the wings and tail surfaces would be kept. So, the aeroplane was dismantled and transported to my home in Eardisland. The fabric was removed from the fuselage revealing the steel tube

framework. This was given a thorough rub down before painting with epoxy primer. The controls were cleaned/repaired and installed in the fuselage before the new fabric was glued on. Once this was complete the whole fuselage was treated to 13 coats of dope (a special product that seals and tautens the fabric). With the fuselage complete and standing on its own wheels it was taken to Shobdon Airfield and the wings and tail surfaces brought back to Eardisland for preparation and painting in the green dope. Once this work was complete these parts were taken to the airfield and reunited with the fuselage.

That left the engine to be dealt with. It had been in storage but was now taken to a specialist firm of aircraft engine overhaulers in Somerset. They stripped the engine down and found that some major components were not in a good enough condition to be re-used and they had to rebuild it using some expensively acquired used parts that were in good condition. This work took about 13 months to complete, and the engine was finally re-installed in the fuselage and test run in early February this year. Some fuel and oil leaks needed to be repaired and it was not until the beginning of May that the aeroplane was able to be flown. There now remains a period of 'running in' during which time the engine has to be run quite aggressively to ensure the internal parts can all bed in properly.

The project has been all consuming for the last three and a half years and I hope that I will now be able to fly it often enough to ensure that I can continue to enjoy the experience!

EARDISLAND WEATHER REPORT

The weather for May in Eardisland continued with the lack of rain with a total of 33mm (1.3 inches) recorded. Temperatures ranged from 15°C to 24°C with barometer pressures ranging from 29.5 to 31.2 bar. The river level was a steady 16 inches.

June continued to be another dry month with only another 33mm (1.3 inches) of rain recorded. Temperatures ranged from 18°C to 32°C and barometer pressures ranged from 29.6 to 30.02. The river level dropped to 10 inches.

PASSPORTS

If you are thinking of going to Europe this year, or later, it is worth bearing in mind that the regulations changed when we left the European Union. To put it bluntly, get it wrong and won't be allowed in. Prior to leaving the EU you could renew a passport before the expiry of the previous one. The balance was added on to the new passport to give the new expiry date which consisted of the date the passport was renewed plus the ten years on the new passport.

Now it is 10 years from the date of issue. In other words, ignore the expiry date on your passport and work from 'date of issue'. Further, different countries require there to be time left on the passport after you leave their country. This varies, but it's usually three or six months. This needs to be checked for the country you intend to visit. Don't get this wrong because it can turn out to be difficult, embarrassing and expensive.

Another issue to bear in mind is that the latest photo driving licences last for ten years only (previously for life to the age of 70). You can check the expiry date on the front of the plastic card under section 4b, or on the back at the top of column 11. You pay for renewal, of course, unless you are 70 years of age or over, in which case the licence lasts for three years and is free to renew. Please don't get this wrong because driving without a licence is an offence and may invalidate your insurance.

Finally, the EHIC cards have been replaced by GHIC cards. Luckily, the EHIC cards are valid until they expire. The replacement GHIC card is free. Be careful not to fall into the trap of companies that advertise on Google and elsewhere to renew your card or licence for a fee. There is no reason at all to use them.
